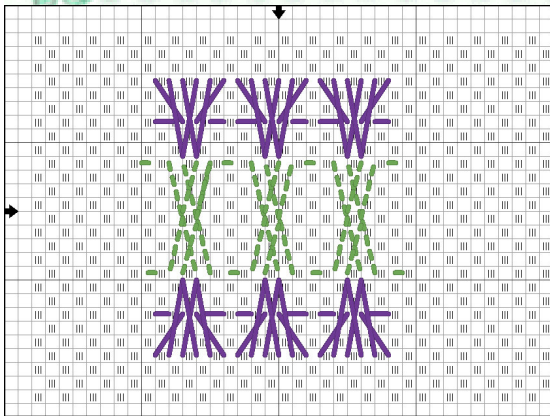
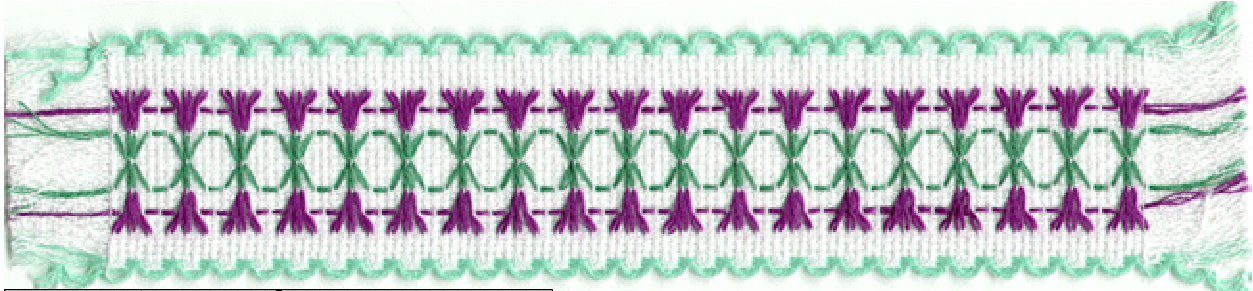


Huck Flower Bookmark

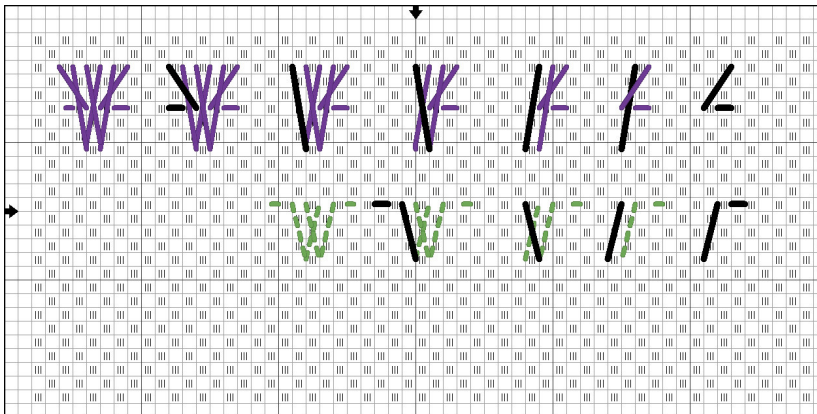

The model was stitched on a Ribband bookmark with 3 strands of DMC floss, #562 for the flower and #552 for the stems. The thread for the flowers must be 5 times the length of the finished row. The stem thread should be 3 1/2 times the width. This is actually not as hard as it appears at first glance, and four rows of stitching will complete the bookmark.



Note on the second graph that I have separated the two threads and then worked through each one step by step. Work from right to left when stitching... Left handed people may find it easier to load the image into a graphic program and flip it. Then they would work from left to right.



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
